### Alligator Alphabet Match

This activity will be a great addition to any Early Childhood play-based curriculum, including High/Scope, Creative Curriculum, or any center-based curriculum.

Alligator Alphabet Match will give children the opportunity to become familiar with alphabetic principles as well as demonstrating knowledge of the alphabet.

### **Objective:**

Students will use this activity to recognize and distinguish between upper and lowercase letters.

### For today's activity, you will need:

- Large round container with lid (e.g. dishwasher tablet container, coffee can, oatmeal container, etc.)
- Construction paper (colors of choice)
- Glue stick/glue gun
- · Large index cards, white cardstock or white poster board
- Various craft materials to create your alligator (e.g. pom poms, googly eyes, etc.)
- Craft scissors (assorted designs)
- 3-inch Block upper and lowercase letters (die cut or see attached PDF)
- X-acto knife or scissors
- Green duct tape or construction paper

### Steps for today's activity:

- 1. Cut out 3 inch block Ellison alphabet letters (both upper and lowercase letters).
  - Die cut with construction paper or use the attached PDFs.
- 2. Glue uppercase letter to the left side of a 4 X 6 white index card (or cardstock) and glue the matching lowercase letter to the right side of the index card.



- 3. Optional: laminate the cards for durability.
  - Visit the LRC-South at Rowan University for lamination services.
- 4. Once alphabet cards are completed (and laminated), use craft scissors with decorative edges to cut down the middle of the cards between the letters.
  - You now have a 2-piece self-correcting puzzle!
- 5. Use various crafts supplies to decorate the container and make your alligator. Give your alligator eyes and a nose. Don't forget to give him a mouth with the scissors or X-acto knife!
  - This provides a fun place for children to "feed" the alligator their completed letter pairs and is also a way to store the letter cards when not in use.
