Objective:


The student will be able to identify beginning sounds of words by listening to the spoken word and selecting the letter that makes the word's beginning sound.

For today's activity, you will need:

- Poster board (22 x 28)
- Various colors of construction paper
- Scissors
- Glue stick
- PDF of beginning sounds photos (or photos of your choice)
- Car die cut or template
- Road die cut or template
- Black marker
- Velcro dots

Steps for today's activity:


- 1. Position the 22" x 28" poster board horizontally.
- 2. Cut 26 cars out of construction paper using either the die cuts or template.
- 3. Cut 12 black roads out of construction paper using either the die cuts or template.
- 4. Glue road strips across poster board to form the roadway. You should have 3-4 complete "roads" across the poster board.
- 5. Label each car with a beginning sound letter combination (Aa, Bb, Cc...) with a black marker or die cut letters.
- 6. Print and cut beginning sound pictures corresponding to each letter use attached PDF or select your own pictures to highlight individual sounds.
- 7. Attach Velcro dots to the roadway and the back of each car leave enough space so multiple cars will fit on the road. Make sure you use "hooks" for roads and "loops" for cars so they attach properly.
- 8. Select the sounds you want to focus on and attach the cars to the roadway.
- 9. Give students the pictures and have them place the picture with the car that matches the beginning sound.

Grid games are an easy, interactive and hands-on way to get students to count, and practice one-to one correspondence. This is also a great activity for students to practice addition and subtraction all while playing!




Mathematics: 4.1: Children begin to demonstrate an understanding of numbers and counting.

Steps for Count and Park grid games:

- 1. Measure a piece of poster board or grey felt approximately 14 x 17.
- 2. Use yellow pipe cleaners or yellow popsicle sticks to make your parking spots. Make enough spots for a small group of students (see example photo below).
- 3. Gather enough small toy cars for students to count and park in the parking spots.
- 4. Have students roll a die, count the number of dots on the die and then park that number of cars in the parking lot. PDF of dies attached.
- 5. **Challenge:** Use two (2) dies to help students practice addition and or subtraction. Students can roll one die, count, and park that number of cars, then roll the other die and repeat. Students can then add both sets of cars together. Roll one die again and have students subtract that number of cars.

Teachers and parents can also demonstrate number sentences.
