The Ph.D. in Education offers students an opportunity to respond to the region's, nation's and world's most persistent educational challenges which obstruct access, success & equity in traditionally underserved communities.

Why specialize in Language & Literacy?

The Language and Literacy Education Ph.D. specialization is designed to prepare individuals for roles in research, policy, and teaching in higher education. The courses examine influential theories and research that address the developmental, cognitive, motivational, multimodal, literary, linguistic, sociocultural and sociopolitical foundations of language and literacy. The program is strongly framed by a critical stance that emphasizes the transformative potential of language and literacy. Candidates for the literacy education doctorate conduct research examining major issues around the interaction of theory, research, and practice in their role in promoting access, equity & success across a range of educational contexts.

Why Rowan University?

Under the guidance of doctoral program faculty, students will have opportunities to submit peer-reviewed publications; present at national conferences; and collaborate on writing grants. Additionally, students will be provided with a critical, interdisciplinary approach to theory and research, supportive faculty, and intentional development of student's academic and professional goals.

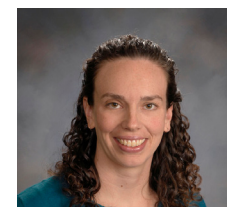

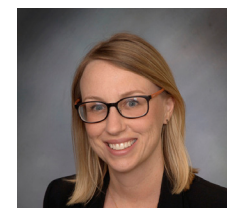
